


Age in 2018: 0-24










There is a shift in the sex ratio between Gen X and Millennials.

Population distribution by gender of the Generation X, Millennials and Born Free, 2018















Between ages 23 – 26 Millennials were more likely to be attending tertiary educational institutions, while Gen X would have been more likely to still be at school

Attendance of educational institutions by Millennials and Gen X aged 23-38 by age, 2002, 2018













Of those that are attending educational institutions, attendance of **tertiary institutions** declined for coloureds, whites and black Africans, whilst tertiary education attendance improved for Indians/Asians from 72,0% for Generation X adults to 95,7% for Millennials.

Attendance of educational institutions of Gen X and Millennials aged 23–38 years by population group, 2002 and 2018














TVET emerges as an educational institution of choice for Millennials



Attendance of educational institutions by Generation X (2002) and Millennial (2018) individuals aged 23–38 by single years














SA's Millennials have made substantial strides in education outcomes. Completed Secondary increased by 8,1 percentage points between the two generations.

Educational attainment among Generation X and Millennial adults aged 23–38, 2002 and 2018








The gender gap in completion of secondary schooling increased from 2,4 percentage points among Generation X individuals to 3,6 percentage points among Millennials. *A greater share of Millennial females achieved Tertiary qualifications.*

The distribution of the highest level of education of **Millennials** aged 23–38 by gender.



Racial gap in completion of secondary education between black Africans and whites was 19,6 percentage points








46,6% of Millennials in the richest household income quintiles completed a tertiary qualification compared to 4,2% in quintile 1. A large percentage of Millennials living in poor households (in quintiles one and two) either had no schooling or dropped out without completing school.

Highest level of education achieved by Millennials aged 23–38 by household income quintiles, 2018








Unemployment for Millennials with tertiary qualification is evident, despite overall higher educational achievements.







There is a shift towards higher levels of education between employed Gen X and Millennials






Large increase in Domestic Workers having some secondary education as highest level attained and near doubling of those with Completed Secondary from 10,8% to 19,3%



Recap

Educational attainment *increased* for both genders. The share of Millennial and Born-free Millennial women who completed secondary schooling was higher than of men.

Among the three generations, Millennials were the most *highly educated*

Adults aged 23-38 who *dropped out of* primary school reduced from 19,5% in 2002 to 6,6% in 2018.

The percentage of individuals aged 23 - 38 with a tertiary qualification *increased* from 10,9% in 2002 to 14,9% in 2018.

There was a higher percentage of unemployed Millennials with a tertiary qualification in 2018 (9,5%) compared to unemployed Gen X adults aged 23–38 in 2002 (5,6%).
